PRINCIPALS REPORT

This week we celebrated all that is good at Peel High School and I reflect on the achievements of the 2022 school year. I would like to share these words from Celebration Day for the final newsletter of 2022.

"Our students and staff have been involved in a array of activities that have seen them excel academically, on the sporting field, culturally and in the performance arena. We have seen students engage and succeed in academic competitions, Tournament of the Minds, public speaking and debating; they have collaboratively written and illustrated 'books in a day', they have run, swum, jumped, bounced, hit, bowled and Bocced their way to success through a plethora of sports, both as participants, coaches and referees, they have fulfilled roles as lines men and women for a number of sports throughout the year and as such have earned individual and team accolades for their involvement at school, regional and state levels.

Shortly after the opening of the beautiful yarning circle, the envy of many schools in Tamworth, early in 2022, Peel High School moved to the Connected Communities Strategy, we have seen our students perform through dance and didge, both here at school and at local events, showcasing their talents and gaining a reputation to be proud of. In 2023 with the support of the staff who lead the Aboriginal Learning and Engagement Centre, Peel High School aims to see the largest cohort of Aboriginal students at Peel High School complete the HSC qualification, as we work towards this important Premier's Priority.



Recently with the initiative of the careers team realised, Peel High School saw the inaugural Alumni event held, with great success and engagement from past students. The day proceeded and was a tremendous success and the positive feedback instilled the continued impressive post school success of Peel High School students.

During a year of severe worldwide staffing shortages, our staff have shown resilience and commitment to your children, often delivering lessons outside their timetabled quota, delivering lessons to reduce merged and minimally supervised classes and for this I say thank you to all our staff for their efforts and hard work throughout the year supporting students to meet their goals. It is important to recognise that large schools run somewhat like a small business with a host of valuable non-teaching staff whose contribution is essential to the delivery of education. Thank you to the administration team, assistants in our specialist teaching areas, our School Learning and Support Officers, General Assistants, Farm Assistant, P and C, canteen manager and volunteers - who enable the school to function at its best as they support students, staff and the school community.

Our core business is teaching and learning and next year schools will see the start of curriculum change across all subjects that will span a five year planned cycle. This will inevitably bring change to subject content and skills and see staff engage in professional learning to meet these changes.

We have a number of times this year been required to return to COVID circuit breaker measures to reduce the risk of infection. We know this has impacted staff, students and families and we thank you for working with us through these difficult times.

As a school we have worked extraordinarily hard to ensure that the structures are in place for your children to attend school 90% or more of the time. We rely on you doing the hard yards at home to support them to be here every day and us working together with you to make School an important place for children to learn and develop the necessary skills required for their transition to post school opportunities. Every staff member plays a role in this development and in particular our careers and SBat teams should be thanked for the efforts they put into assisting these processes.

We ask that you, our parents/caregivers, keep working with us in a positive manner because it is when the caregivers and school adults are working in the same direction we can best support our young people to get the best outcomes in life. As we move towards the holiday break, I wish everyone a safe and happy holiday season. I thank you all for your support of Peel High School over the past 12 months and I look forward to seeing you back here in 2023."

SCHOLARSHIP SUCCESS!

Congratulations to the following students who have been successful in being awarded scholarships to support their high school and tertiary education from 2023.

Caitlin Blanch, from Year 11, is the recipient of the Unions NSW Jeff Shaw Memorial Scholarship, from the Public Education Foundation, a well deserved resource for Caitlin, as she goes into her final year of high school in 2023.


Sophie and her family will be invited to an Awards Night to celebrate her scholarship in the new year.

In the early hours of the 28th November, 55 students from Year 10 departed for 5 days of adventure on the Gold Coast. We arrived at the Gold Coast Performance Centre and after quickly settling into our dorms, we divided into groups for our first activity. We enjoyed activities such as swimming and laser skirmish, where the students worked in teams.

Day 2 was jam packed full of new experiences and skill building. We started the day with some Indigenous games on the beach, followed by stand-up paddle boarding, free swimming and beach games. After a quick change we headed into Surfer's Paradise to test our skills at Time Zone, Zone Bowling and Putt Putt.






After a sleep in and breakfast, Day 3 saw the group enter a world of fantasy and fun, meet their favourite superheroes and super-villains, and experience the exhilaration of world class adventure rides and attractions at Warner Bros. Movie World. We finished the day with a fish n chip picnic dinner before heading back to the Gold Coast Performance Centre to unwind and relax with a movie night.

The weather turned for the worst on Day 4, however that didn't stop our explorers who spent the day enjoying the cafes and shops of Pacific Fair.

We were up early on Friday for our long expedition home. Throughout the week we received many compliments on how well our students represented our school, their manners and the respect they showed each other, the venues we visited and their teachers. New friendships were formed and old ones strengthened and we all got to know ourselves and each other a little better. This will serve the group well as we move into the senior school.

I would like to say a huge thank you to Nicola Burmester and Zac Deahm for giving up their week so our group could have this opportunity. A huge thank you also goes out to the classroom teachers here at school who covered classes so that teachers could attend the excursion.









LUNCHTIME ADVENTURES

Almost every lunchtime up in the Industrial Arts block, we've been running daily role playing sessions. This has been running consistently for three terms, with over 50 students joining our games at times, and 20 regular students who attend our sessions at least twice a week. On Mondays, we've had all players together, discussing their characters and their adventures, or working out what they'll do in future sessions, while on later days during the week we've narrowed the groups down to a group of students focused on a group of friends in Year 9, another day focusing on a group of friends in Year 11, another group focusing on junior students in Years 7 and 8 and a final group of players who all belong to the school's support unit.

We've found that each of the groups of students has added diversity into the mix, and developed their own playstyles and social exploration. The Year 11 students tend to play more tactically and cooperatively, the Year 9 students engage in the narrative storytelling, and the junior students are still finding their voices. The support students consider the game a safe space to explore their social skills, and through random rolls of the dice are beginning to learn that there are things out of their control, and that sometimes life just doesn't flow in expected ways. Each of the groups is learning that sometimes a story is more interesting when one participant doesn't solely control the narrative, and when everyone gets the chance to add their voice to the community. They learn this individually in their small groups as they solve puzzles, fight monsters and explore the unknown; and they learn this collectively as they share their adventures with the other groups and piece together perspectives to build a bigger picture of the world around them.

We have played a number of games, including the most commonly known roleplaying-system, Dungeons & Dragons, but we've also orchestrated a science fiction heist game using the Cyberpunk Red System, and developed our own game called The Shattered City. This last game has seen input from all the students and the first booklets of the system will be ready to publish before school goes back in early 2023. The Shattered City has been specifically designed as a game where simple stories can be played out over a lunchbreak, but extended sessions during a sport slot are hoped to be tested soon. Students have helped contribute to descriptions of locations and key people in the stetting, and have provided maps and pictures of the world where the stories are being told.




Imagination is being fostered, cooperation is expected, and research is encouraged. If the students do well in their study of historical cultures in our world, or the patterns of geography, they can incorporate this into their world building. If they do well in mathematical statistics or probability, they will better understand the systems that govern play in their games. Those students excelling in English are encouraged to write about the stories of their characters in the world, or establish stories and lore that help to define the world, while those excelling artistically are encouraged to draw or paint the characters and the places they encounter. Everything in the game is directed back at the studies of the students, so that it helps to form a support for their studies rather than a distraction.

At the moment, the program is still a work in progress but we have had noticeable improvement among a number of students socialising across the school outside their immediate peer groups, and providing a safe liminal space for exploring concepts like identity, how working against people can lead to conflict and problems, and how working together using each other's strengths can lead to success. By exploring these concepts through characters, rather than needing to expose themselves to the world, anything that goes wrong can be dismissed as part of the story, anything that goes right can be used for encouragement and support, and everything in the game can be used as a valuable learning experience.
