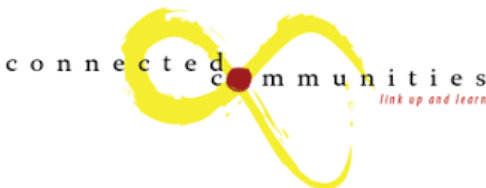
The HSC results are released on the 14th December and we wish our year 12 students well with these. We hope that this qualification unlocks the opportunities that will make their futures all the brighter.

Congratulations Aaliyah Morley!

The year 12 student has been recognised at the NSW Nanga Mai awards, where she was the recipient of the 'NSW School-Based Apprentice/Trainee of the Year' award.

The Nanga Mai Awards, recently held in Darling Harbour in Sydney, are for recognising and celebrating the outstanding achievements in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander education. Aaliyah received her award from Deputy Premier and Minister for Education Prue Car.

This is not the first state award Aaliyah has received this year, as back in September she was the recipient of the prestigious 'NSW Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Student of the Year' award at this year's NSW State Training Awards.

CONGRATULATIONS NEEVE!

Peel High's very own rocket scientist!

On 27th November the Young Scientist Awards were held at the University of Technology, Sydney. These awards recognise the most outstanding Science projects in NSW under the categories of Scientific Investigations and Technological Innovations from students in Kindergarten through to Year 12.

We are excited to announce that Year 12 student Neeve Davies was awarded first place in the Year 11-12 Physics category for her Extension Science Project "The Effect of Fin Sweep Angle on a Model Rocket's Flight".

Rockets are an essential component of space technology, and Neeve wanted to investigate the role that the angle of the fin has on its flight. Using a combination of first-hand measurements, collected through a series of model rocket launches, and simulations using the Open Rocket simulator, she demonstrated that increasing the sweep angle increased the maximum height of the rocket's flight.

Neeve was one of only a handful of rural and regional students to be recognised in the ceremony, and the only regional student to attend a public school. This is an outstanding achievement and we can't wait to see what is next for Neeve!

COWS, COB LOAFS & WOODEN PIGS

Students continue to be hard at work.

On the farm, Mr McCabe has been talking to students about Artificial Insemination. This is the process used to impregnate female cows without bulls. He discussed the purpose of AI in the Agricultural Industry and the benefits this has for farmers, schools and the beef industry.



In the Kitchens, Year 10 students made Spinach and Bacon cob loaf. The Spinach was grown in the schools Agriculture farm. The students were responsible for picking, washing and preparing their own spinach for their cob loaf recipes.



In the Woodwork room, Stage 4 Girls have been continuing their hard work on designing their wall pendants. The class has been learning about the design process, why it is important to plan out your work first and then transfer your design to the timber. They have learnt about workshop safety and have a good understanding of how to use a number of hand tools and equipment to make their design projects.



Stage 4 boys class have also been busy in the Woodwork room, designing their very own hand fishing reels and lures this term. They have followed the design process and researched the best designs. In the workshop they have learnt new skills, how to use equipment, tools and machinery safely. Another fun project they have been working on is making a pig inspired by the design from the video game Minecraft. The boys have also been learning about pigs, feeding and welfare and assisted in growing them for the show and utilising paddock to plate by using the bacon in their food technology lessons.

Students have been working hard this year to develop their precision cutting skills to develop food items.
