

PRINCIPALS REPORT

Term 2 has been a term filled with opportunities for community engagement and we have loved having community and family members in the school. The 'Elders Lunch' saw students and family members alike celebrate with dance and song and a sit-down lunch cooked by students and staff. A collaborative effort led by our Senior Leader Community Engagement, Janine Way, saw the day come together beautifully. Reconciliation week was celebrated across the school with daily activities that saw students in large numbers engage in dance workshops, weaving, art and a family connections workshop our students visiting and connecting with our feeder primary schools to share dance and musical performances. Peel High School combined with the Tamworth High School Aboriginal Dance Group to perform at the NSW Secondary Principals Conference that was held here in Tamworth at the TREC. The performance celebrated Gomeroi culture and was overwhelmingly enjoyed by Principals from across the state. Parent teacher night saw parents and carers meet with their children's teachers to work together to achieve best outcomes for their children academically and socially in the school environment. It was great to see so many parents and carers take the opportunity to talk with teachers here at school. Ms Robson held an information evening for parents/carers and students interested in participating in an overseas excursion for Stage 6 Ancient History and Art students in 2024. Community members and students have been invited this term to engage in forums to provide feedback with the HSC Attainment team, with forums for parents being held at school and the Youthie and students have been consulted to provide student voice around both HSC attainment and the 'Safeguarding Kids Together' Program. Term 2 has seen student reports delivered students to take home, if you have any questions regarding your children's reports, please make sure to contact school to have your questions answered.



We continue to celebrate student achievement at Peel High School. Of note we celebrate our school captain, Caitlin Blanch's achievement in the Plain English Speaking Competition. Caitlin competed in the finals of the competition, on the 22 June, which involved the final 6 competitors in the state. Congratulations Caitlin on your efforts to deliver both your prepared and impromptu speech with aplomb. Sophie Day has this week spent time with other NSW recipients of the Harding Miller Scholarship, culminating in the prestigious award night on 26 June in Sydney.



Aaliyah Morley has been named 2023 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander of the Year for New England NSW Region at the recent NSW Training Awards event, a recognition of Aaliyah's commitment to her Certificate IIII in School Based Education Support. Chayse Sheppard and Zac Spreadborough have spent time this term in the Northern Territory as part of their School Based Trainee program with the Indigenous Ranger Program in an exchange through the Tamworth Local Aboriginal Lands Council. Our Agriculture Show Team received a wonderful shoutout from a respected member of the sheep farming community, recognising the exceptional qualities of both the staff and students and in particular a special shout out to Chloe Moss for her sheep judging expertise and the efforts of Mr Bowman and Ms Wyse in supporting the students.

As the term comes to a close, we say thank you and farewell to Ms Malinda Canham who has been relieving as the Senior Administration Manager for the past 12 months and Ms Lily Kipp who has been a permanent member of staff in the Support Faculty. We wish them well as they continue their journeys in education and thank them for their contributions to Peel High School. In term 3 we will welcome a number of new staff to the Peel High School family.

I wish all our families and staff and safe July holiday break and look forward to seeing you all back here in Term 3. Staff Development Day for all staff will be held on Monday July 17 and students return to school on Tuesday July 18.














DEADLY DHARRIBAA

Our Yarning Circle group got off to a Deadly start!

Students have started the sessions with the skill of painting, sharing as a group the influences in our lives around creativity.

We yarned with Students around what they would like this group to be about, as it is a co-designed group with the students and Aboriginal Education Staff, assisting with engagement and connection at School.

Students felt empowered and fully heard, there is so much positive and allowing the students to safely use their voices.

The students gave us an amazing variety of activities and learning points they would like to participate in a culturally safe and supportive group.

The Deadly Dharri-baa group will involve conflict resolution in a safe way, healthy relationship building, Communication skills and assistance with assessments and school life in general.

The delivery of these sessions will all be hands on, interactive and each lesson students will have a token of what they had learned as a visual to remember.

This group will run weekly, during sport time organised by Peel High Aboriginal Education team.

Extended Leave




TERRIFIC TITRATION



COOKING & FENCING

Throughout the term, the combined Girls and Boys Class in Stage 4 enthusiastically embraced the culinary journey, honing their food preparation and cutting skills. The girls delved into the significance of various coloured chopping boards, mastering the safe and correct knife techniques to craft culinary creations. Moreover, they explored catering for diverse dietary needs, relishing the opportunity to create scrumptious apple cinnamon vegan muffins. Alongside the enjoyment and fun experienced, the students prioritized safety, maintaining excellent hygiene practices, and adhering to Workplace Health and Safety (WHS) guidelines.







Within our Technology Mandatory classes, we have successfully cultivated a supply of traditional Yams, a significant crop in Aboriginal history. Year 9 Food Technology students enthusiastically utilized these Yams to create delectable yam and pea fritters, celebrating their rich cultural heritage. They were so popular we decided to make a batch especially for the Elders who had been invited into the school to share







Selected students collaborated with Hospitality students to cater for the Elders' lunch, preparing a diverse menu including beef stroganoff, curried sausages, curry coconut chicken, and curried mince. Emphasising hygiene protocols, all dishes were meticulously cooked, properly packaged, and served with rice, employing appropriate equipment throughout the process.




